I think being bordered by two main, busy roads makes it not feel as restful as other parks.Putting in bigger trees and dense garden beds around the perimeter might help, but need to balance that against keeping passive surveillance. Could you get rid of some of the on-street parking around the park and put in larger street trees/plantings? To buffer against the roads, but not the footpaths? Sort of like the University Square redevelopment in Carlton.Generally- would be good to see more trees and interesting native plantings, maybe a woody meadow (like the one in Royal Park).It might also be a good place to put in some dirt bike jumps. I noticed kids/teenagers were busy building these during lockdown along Moonee Ponds/Merri Creeks, destroying revegetation efforts. Would be good to provide a space for that.Another idea is making the existing diagonal path a bike cut-through, so cyclists can avoid the Blyth/Lygon intersection.A public toilet would be great. Would make the park much more useable (especially the playground!).

The fence that runs along the house is run down and makes the space feel less safe. More could be done to hide/ better incorporate the apartment block. there is at least one gate that opens up to the park. Maybe put a path in there and more bordering plants. Plants in the garden beds are often sparce and weeds quickly pop up in the mulch.-there is no path to the playground-The open grass area is nice, but the grass itself is bare in spots and not very nice to sit down-Wildlife- strong magpie presence especially over winter/spring with fledgling magpies, other birds sighted include noisy mynahs, rainbow loris, crested pigeon. Tried to save a baby ringtail possum from this park.- When the taco truck comes to the park there are many more people there, but no picnic tables.- All the seats in the park face lygon st, I'd like them to look at different aspects- The pergola tucked against the fence doesn't feel like a nice space to spend any time. There is often cans and rubbish in this area.- there are other parks in the area with large open spaces, so it would be good for this park to have a different drawcard- more plants and aspects to look at, a really interesting playground etc.What I'd like to see:- a bbq or picnic area (tables/benches) towards the centre of the park, and removal of the current pergola- a space for community to gather, e.g a community garden space, a small skate park or table tennis table for older kids/adults, communtiy planting event to increase ownership over the space.- Keep all mature native trees. Increase plants and variety in the understorey planting, especially native plants. There is lots of Dietes at the entrances to the park which flower all at once and look scrappy otherwise.- planning with the intention for more food trucks to use the space, and better picninc spaces- keep the bluestone to some degree. The path is uneven so not accessable to all, but I like that it is not the same as every park and has a bit of history. Potenitally change to concrete with bluestone border.-potentially a toilet- better maintained grass for picnics- benches that face different aspects I'm looking forward to improvements at the park as it is a great green space in a busy area.</p>

Would like fence around entire park (ideal) / or playground (less ideal but still good) as very busy roads nearby. Could plant more vegetation to have a plant-fence in front of a more structured fence. I like having swings, the little "kitchen" area in play equipment and the piles of rocks/bluestone edging are great for creative play. If play equipment changed would like a more natural/wood look, adventure/creative spaces (like at the RCH playground with rocks/stumps/water pump/bushes etc. possibly a little bbq area with shelter but I'm mindful of issues with security in the area so would be equally happy not to have this. There is a run down paved area near a neighbouring property that could have a picnic table. Love to keep green areas for grass picnic, kicking balls. Creating a little hill area towards the back of the park would be fun for kids. Would like the area to be no dogs, as so many parks in Brunswick are busy with dogs and this makes it hard with small children. I fear there are nasties hiding in the bark and currently don't feel it is safe for little ones.- an upgrade to the play equipment to keep it contemporary and engaging.- rubbish bins with the fixed openings (both landfill & recycling) to encourage people to use them instead of having to open the current lid. N/A	Sep 29, 2020	Craig	<p>Dear Mr. Blight,</p> <p>I am writing in response to the advertised planned upgrade to Anderson Park, corner Blyth Street and Lygon Street, Brunswick East. As one of the residents whose residential property borders the park, I deeply care about maintaining a park that (i) protects the green space and (ii) serves the diverse population of local residents and community visitors who currently enjoy the park and its facilities. To this end, I wish to recommend to the planning committee the following:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none">1. Maintaining green space – that the same area of land cover be maintained. In my six years at the property across all seasons people of all ages enjoy the open grass spaces. Children run and play ball games. Adults sit, meditate, read, meet and chat with friends, picnic. Currently, there is enough space and mix of shade and sun for individuals and groups to children, young and older adults appreciate the space to sit on grass. Please do not reduce the overall area or the open grass space. Continuing to attend to the health of the grass and covering concrete drain/pipe covers at the southern end is recommended.2. Maintaining bluestone paths – paths are well placed for regular traffic. That the path is blue stone is at once an attractive feature but also deters fast travelling cycles, skateboards roller-blades and other vehicles from taking the short cut across the Lygon-Blyth Street corner. There are already enough dangers on footpaths bordering the park where parents need to be extra vigilant of toddlers as much as caring for their own safety. Many cyclists, roller-bladers and skateboarders currently travel these paths but are less dangerous to others in the park.3. Maintain and upgrade children’s play area without making it bigger – while I appreciate that there is an opportunity to upgrade the playground which supports local and visiting children, children are not the main users of the park across the day. Ensuring an attractive children’s area within the existing bluestone perimeter with appropriate safety upgrades is important. Maintaining the balance for residents across the demographic is equally important.

Maintain large trees – large trees like the eucalypts provide shade, attract and house birds and are marvellous to look at. There is an opportunity to review the shrubs surrounding some of the larger trees that abut Lygon and Blyth Streets. Whether it is replacing or attending to some unhealthy, crowded plants at the base of these trees, the council is wise to invest in this for the well being of the health of the plants as well as attending to the ‘window’ as passers-by look into the green space. Please do not add any more trees to the open grass spaces.</p> <p>5. Maintain park benches – those that exist are well spread, well positioned and well utilised by members of our community. As the seasons and time of day change, all provide sun or shade as preferred. These could do with repainting. As you will notice, the key word here is maintaining. I love to look out my window, sit on my balcony or be ‘out there’ myself to see how well appreciated Anderson Park is as it is. I am sure you have done your own research of usage and demographics through the day and across the seasons (at least I hope the Council has!) but from morning to night I see people of all ages enjoy this well balanced green space. I am eager support improvements while confirming benefit balance to the immediate community.</p> <p>While I love Anderson Park and care for its preservation and sustained future, there is some anti-social behaviour. Occasional drug deals are made and late night drinking parties Fridays and Saturdays, especially in summer. Thankfully, the current openness of the park does not encourage less desirable behaviour for neighbouring residents. There is sufficient night lighting in the park and on neighbouring streets. Let’s upgrade Anderson Park but maintain its attraction to locals who love and use it.</p> <p>I am happy to be contacted in regards to any of the points raised in my letter. I trust in the consultation process and equally trust you and the planning committee will consider recommendations made.</p>	
			<p>Hi Andrew. It is very exciting to read that Anderson Park is to be upgraded. We have lived next to this park for 12 years and have been commenting lately that it is a little dated compared to several parks around that have already been upgraded.</p> <p>This park (pre COVID) is utilised by people of all ages. Changes that we believe would ensure children’s safety whilst playing include fencing the boundaries along Blyth and Lygon Streets.</p> <p>We have witnessed several incidents when toddlers and young children have fallen from the raised bluestone walls around the play equipment. Levelling the playground space would also improve the safety aspects.</p> <p>The installation of more swings and play equipment catering for children aged 1-12 years would also be beneficial.</p> <p>There are a several old wooden structures along the western fence line that need to be removed/replaced. The bluestone path that runs through the middle of the park needs to be repaid/replaced. Maybe a path could be put around the perimeter of the park for small children to ride their bikes/scooters.</p> <p>Many Thanks Laurie Burns.</p>
